## ASH WEDNESDAY...February 17, 2021

In Western Christianity, Ash Wednesday marks the start of the season of Lent. Officially named "Day of Ashes,"

During Ash Wednesday mass or services, a minister distributes ashes by lightly rubbing the shape of a cross with ashes onto the foreheads of worshipers. The tradition of tracing a cross on the forehead is meant to identify the faithful with Jesus Christ.

Ashes are a symbol of death in the Bible. God formed humans out of dust:

Then the Lord God formed the man from the dust of the ground. He breathed the breath of life into the man's nostrils, and the man became a living person. (Genesis 2:7), Human beings return to dust and ashes when they die:

"By the sweat of your brow will you have food to eat until you return to the ground from which you were made. For you were made from dust, and to dust you will return." (Genesis 3:19, NLT)

The Bible does not mention Ash Wednesday or the custom of Lent, however, the practice of repentance and mourning in ashes is found in Job 2:8; Daniel 9:3; and Matthew 11:21.

Historically, Baptist have not participated in Ash Wednesday services with fasting and mourning, however, it is becoming a trend for them to do so in the past few years. The denominations that used to be really strict about it have lightened their rules over the years. Many people give up something that they like for Lent. If you decide to join in and do that during the Lent season this year, give up something you really like. For me it would be no big deal to give up eating liver, but giving up pasta would be terribly hard for me. Maybe I will give up pasta or sugar this year and when I think of these foods I gave up, I will then stop and pray. I feel that would be an excellent thing for me to do. If you should decide to join me in this, remember it does not need to be food you give up, it can be something you do as well.

#### SHROVE TUESDAY, FAT TUESDAY, and MARDI GRAS... are they the same?

Every year, Mardi Gras falls the day before Ash Wednesday. And this timing is no coincidence. Ash Wednesday marks official beginning of Lent, a period of prayer, fasting, and repentance that Catholics and some other Christians observe before Easter. While today, Catholics commonly don't eat meat on Fridays during Lent, in the past, Lenten fasting was far more strict. "Mardi Gras" is French for Fat Tuesday. The holiday is also known as Shrove Tuesday (from an Old English word meaning to confess) or Pancake Day. Historically, people would spend Fat Tuesday (and sometimes the weeks leading up to it) indulging in the foods (and behaviors) they would abstain from during Lent. Some would also use the day as an opportunity to confess their sins to a priest before the start of Lent. Beyond the fun of it, there was a practical reasoning behind Fat Tuesday feasts — meat and dairy products would go bad before Lent was over. The occasion became one big celebration, sometimes known as Carnival (a Latin word meaning "to remove meat").

#### LIVING IN A TIME OF NEVER QUITE SURE...

One of my favorite quotes is found in a book by James Gleick called: Faster: The Acceleration Of Just About Everything. He interviews the scientist in charge of the atomic clock that is responsible for keeping the precise time. In response to a question, the keeper of the clock replies, "A man with a clock always knows the time. A man with two clocks is never quite sure."

We live in the time of never quite sure. Sometimes this is good as learning the perspectives of those who are different from us can inform and enlarge our world. Not being overly proud and self-centered are surely Christian virtues.

But it seems more and more that we live in a bifurcated world where we have people who are sure, but who argue from different clocks. There is a certain arrogance entailed in this way of thinking that destroys the opportunity for community.

Even more insidious are those who in bad faith seek to argue that regardless of one clock being objectively right they argue for their own time. Arguing that the atomic clock's measurement is somehow inferior and flawed and that the experts are wrong and a \$10 wristwatch from the store has a better keeping of time.

In the time of never quite sure, we have arguments about obscure election laws, whether to take a vaccine, or the place of our country in the world. And the resulting conversations seem to happen as if the clocks clearly don't agree on the time.

It can be scary and disheartening in the land of not quite sure. That is why I am happy to have the certainty of my faith that reminds me that in the time of Caesar Augustus, God sent Jesus into the world as the one true clock measuring not the passing of time but grace and truth.

Our clock is the Holy Trinity and as long as our hearts are set to it, even in the time of never quite sure, we follow Christ together.

**Everyone loves love.** We all need it. We all crave it. But what is this thing called love?

God's love is amazing because it's proactive. It's expressed by action. It cost Him a lot, and it's the love we need. Other forms of love have their place, but nothing less can take the place of His love. We need the real thing.

Do you know that God loves you? Or do you find that hard to believe? Well, it's the truth; and it's been demonstrated powerfully by Jesus. The thing is, love is better when it's not done at a distance. So, will you come near to God and receive His amazing love by repenting of your sins and believing in Jesus?







