FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK...

Greetings Church Family,

Every month as the time comes to prepare a message for this newsletter, it seems like I always think of how fast a month can fly by. This month, though, that statement might not ring as true. By now the impact of the coronavirus, the daily reports of unrest around the country, and the uncertainty of the future has many of us feeling like time has slowed to a crawl. I do hope that wherever you find yourself, you know how much I miss being with you all in person. Technology has allowed us to be connected in some ways, but I miss worship and fellowship and (of course) potlucks!

A challenge for our church has been to figure out how to plan for the months ahead. One of the things that the coronavirus has confirmed is that we just don't know what tomorrow will hold! With that being the case, we can only act on the information in front of us at the moment and trust that our next steps will be made clear. Perhaps this is a great example of what it means to walk by faith, with our best steps being to be faithful in the moment directly in front of us.

With that in mind, we do want to announce that we are ready to announce a date for resuming our in person worship. If all goes according to plan, we will resume in person worship on **Sunday**, **July 19**.

In the early days of the pandemic, I remember proclaiming that our first Sunday back would be Easter Sunday, no matter when it fell on the calendar. Many of us pictured a full sanctuary, glorious music, and hopefully a meal at the end of it all. Knowing what we know now, it is clear that a Sunday like that would be wishful thinking and if enacted now would not be safe.

Upon gathering, worship will look a bit different. Due to social distancing procedures, we will ask that everyone please wear a mask and stay 6 feet apart. Hand sanitizer will be available throughout the building. We will not have any congregational singing and there will also be no child care or Sunday School. Our service will perhaps be shortened in length, but there will be a time where we can be in the building together!

As we look toward July 19, I want to encourage you to please consider your own health and safety in making a determination on whether or not to attend. We know that the virus is still a real threat and as your pastor I would prefer that you take the cautious route to protect yourself and your family.

In terms of celebration, our online service has been a tremendous blessing for those that can attend. We will continue to host our worship on Facebook Live each Sunday. For the time being, this means that those in the sanctuary will see recording equipment on stage that typically is not there. People around the country have been worshiping with us and we want to provide a high quality worship experience for those that are not yet ready to be with us in person.

Additionally, we feel a need to find other ways to connect with each other in the days to come. We hope to announce opportunities for fellowship that might carry less risk and will allow us to see each other. We will announce those things as soon as possible.

Announcements like this are interesting for a pastor because I feel a mixture of joy and concern regarding the how, why, and when we gather. I am thankful for our newly formed coordinating council and their guidance in helping us think through these issues. We WANT to be together. We just want to make sure what we do so in the safest way possible.

If you have any questions or if there is anything that the church can do for you during this time, please do not hesitate to call the church office. Someday this will all be nothing more than a memory and we will be able to see God's hand guiding all along the way.

Thank you for your kindness in handling this situation. I hear horror stories of churches that are fighting with each other about how to worship and I take great pride in how well you all have been supportive of the decision making up to this point. Shine on. Press on. Go on.

Cloud Dough

2 ingredient play dough

Prep Time: 5 min.

Keyword: cloud dough, cornstarch play dough

Ingredients

1/2 cup lotion regular lotion or baby lotion
1 cup cornstarch also called corn flour

Instructions

Add 1/2 cup of lotion to a bowl. Add 1-2 drops of the food coloring (if using concentrated gel, if using regular food coloring you'll need more drops to color) and mix

Mix the lotion and food coloring until combined.


Add 1 cup of cornstarch and mix.

Mix until combined.

Then take out the dough and place on some wax paper. Knead with your hands (you may want gloves here so your hands don't stain). Keep kneading until it forms a dough-like consistency. If it's still too sticky add another tablespoon of cornstarch.

Once your cloud dough is finished, use cookie cutters and rolling pins to play with it!

To store: simply put the play dough in plastic wrap and store in an airtight container to help it last longer. If the dough dries out, add a few extra squirts of lotion to it and knead back in.




