FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK...

From Our Children's Minister

Dear church,

We're thrilled to finally announce that our children's area will be reopening for in-person children's church on Sunday, May 23rd! Our first Sunday back we'll be starting a new series about the Bible called "Better than Gold!"

While we're taking this step towards normal we will be easing into things and doing some things differently. At this time we will not yet be having children's Sunday School, and we will not be having a children's moment in the sanctuary. Parents are asked to bring their kids upstairs upon arrival for check-in. All volunteers, as well as children over five will be asked to wear a mask, as well as any younger children who are able to do so. There will be sanitizer available upon arrival and as always, toys will be disinfected after each service. In order to keep our kids and their families as safe as possible, at this time all volunteers must be fully vaccinated. All of these procedures will be reevaluated once things are running smoothly, and we hope to reinstate Sunday School and children's chat soon.

When we reopen on May 23rd we will no longer be having weekly video chats with the kids since we hope to see their faces in person! We will also not be mailing lesson materials home to parents, although there will still be digital materials that they may download.

When we reopen we will be in need of many volunteers to make our new, socially-distanced children's service work! I know so many of you have eagerly asked me when our children will be returning and now that this can be a reality I hope that just as many of you will step up to the plate and volunteer so we can give our kids the safe and welcoming environment they deserve. Thanks be to God that we are finally able to make this step. Please prayerfully consider what role you may be able to play in making this next step towards normal a positive one for our kids and their families. If you are not fully vaccinated or are otherwise unable to volunteer, there are still things that you can do to support our kids and their families so please consider what your gifts and abilities may be and give me a call. I'm grateful God has filled our church with such talented and generous people, because we will be needing you all now more than ever to make this next step of reopening a success.



THE OTHER SIDE OF WHY Sharon Jaynes "My ears had heard of you but now my eyes have seen you." Job 42:5 (NIV)

My son, Steven, and I sat on the floor in his room, playing a card game. This summer was proving to be the best ever. Our golden retriever, Ginger, had just delivered seven adorable puppies; Steven was enjoying his sixth summer of life, and after four years of negative pregnancy tests, God had surprised us with a new life growing inside my womb.

But as Steven and I sat cross-legged on the carpet, I sensed something was wrong. A trip to the bathroom confirmed my greatest fears. Later that afternoon, the doctor voiced the weighty words, "There is no heartbeat."

What do you do when heartbreak slams into joy? When your soul cracks open and there just aren't enough tears? When hurt steals your hope, and you want to give up on life? When deep soul lesions make a mockery of your faith?

I wish I could tell you I left the doctor's office quoting Romans 8:28a about how "... all things work together for good ..." (ESV). I wish I could tell you that I calmly accepted the loss of my baby with faith, trusting that even this was somehow part of God's plan. I wish I could tell you I spent the rest of the day singing "It is Well with My Soul." But I didn't do any of those things.

I went home, crawled in bed and pulled the covers up over my empty womb and broken heart. I didn't want to talk to anyone, especially God. And what I did say to Him wasn't very nice.

How could You do this to me? If this is how you treat those You love, then just forget it! You answered my prayer only to take it back! Why me? Why this? Why now?

Job was a man in the Bible who also had a lot of questions for God. In one day, his enemies killed all but a handful of his servants and stole all 11,000 heads of livestock. Then a strong wind collapsed his son's house and killed all 10 of Job's children. If we're familiar with the story, though, we know how it all ends: The Lord not only restored what Job had lost, but "gave him twice as much as he had before" (Job 42:10b, NIV).

But can you imagine what it was like to live through it in real time? Job was stuck in a bad story, and he saw no end in sight. He had no idea why it was happening. He didn't know God would give him twice as much as he had before. All he knew was loss, disappointment and pain. That might be where you are right now, stuck in a story you don't like. But hang on! God's pen has not slipped. He's still in control. There's more to come.

My favorite line in Job's story comes at the very end. Job says to God, "My ears had heard of you but now my eyes have seen you" (Job 42:5). That is my prayer in every difficult circumstance of life. I don't want to simply hear about God; I want to see God and have communion with Him in the midst of it.

Sometimes we have to let go of our plans to take hold of God's purpose ... and it's always good. A house full of children was not how my chapter of infertility and the loss of a child ended, but I can still say it had a good ending. God has made me fertile in so many other areas, and I wouldn't change a thing. When women come to me trying to make sense of the disappointments in their lives, I can say, "Come, sit with me. Let me tell you a story."



Each week, I conclude my article with the phrase "following Christ together." It is I think the best and most concise description of what it means to be a part of CBF Kentucky and CBF. This has struck home with me in the past couple of weeks.

You probably have noticed our recent emphasis on disaster response work. Some weeks ago now, our Disaster Response Coordinator, Brian Varble, arranged a trip to Lake Charles, LA for hurricane clean up work. I am excited to be joining the group in helping in this effort. This sort of work is always important, but this is particularly vital because the hurricane struck before Covid and we will be the first team to come and help in well over a year. We are doing it in solidarity with CBF Louisiana as we follow Christ together.

With these arrangements in place, disaster struck much closer to home. The recent flooding in Eastern Kentucky was so dramatic that it was featured on the national news. This made me feel a bit guilty. Why were we sending a team to Louisiana when there was work much closer to home? We have arranged in partnership with Together For Hope and First Frankfort for housing and work opportunity for those interested (feel free to ask for details!). But why go elsewhere when the need is here?

And then I got a phone call from Jay Kieve, the coordinator of CBF South Carolina. He told me that as a part of their annual meeting next week, they will be collecting cleaning buckets for flood relief in Eastern Kentucky. Even more exciting was his report that he is expecting a church in his state to send volunteers to Eastern Kentucky.

It is an example of God's provision and the complicated web of grace in which we live. Louisiana needs help and Kentucky comes. Kentucky has a need and South Carolina is on the way. It is what happens when we follow Christ together.


