FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK...

Greetings church family!

As the cooler weather has arrived and my garden and flower beds have begun to reach their end, I can't help but find myself thinking back on what the past year has looked like. Last winter I spent lots of time researching and planning what I wanted to plant, thought of where things would go, and every few days I would receive a package in the mail with a few more seeds.

I planted hundreds and hundreds of seeds. In my raised bed garden, some things thrived. I especially enjoyed the lemon cucumbers, Kentucky Wonder pole beans, and zinnias. Other things struggled a bit more, like carrots and a few herbs. Nevertheless, I was captivated.

My house is not large, but over half of the perimeter is covered by flower beds, not including the additional beds also in the backyard as well. For the past two years they had not looked great and so I was determined to fill them with our favorites, particularly black eyed susans and wild bergamot. The day after I planted hundreds of seeds? We got about 5 inches of rain. I'm convinced that the seeds were washed away as almost none of them produced.

And so this year in my yard was a learning experience. Some things thrived. Some perennials I planted last year came back in full force, healthier than ever. Some plants I bought from Lowes grew way bigger than I expected and so now some of my landscaping looks different than I planned. And some things didn't work so well.

Not all of the plants were purchased. Friends and family shared their perennials with me and I expect those to continue to grow in the next few years. When I see them I thank God for good friends who share from what they have. Some flowers that came just somehow appeared, most likely with the help of the birds in the area. Each brought joy in it's own way.

Spending time in the garden has helped me think a lot about what it means to be the church. Sometimes when we look at a church history book we believe that all of our hard work is culminating in one event where we meet one purpose and that is the story we will tell forever.

Instead, I think it is helpful to remember that we are always in a state of planting seeds, pulling weeds, learning what works and what doesn't work, and enjoying the harvest as it comes. Sometimes things that were meaningful will even die out. But, there is hope for next season.

I don't know what season we are in, in the face of COVID, but I suspect that it is a mixture of all of these elements. We are working and learning and struggling and growing. If we pay attention we will find God at work. At the same time we make preparation for the work that lies ahead. We can be sad that some things won't look like we want or expect, but we can also be hopeful for the good things that are also coming our way.

Perhaps we are not just building up for the "next big thing," but embracing the season in which we find ourselves. Will you join me in praying for our church that we will be faithful in taking advantage of this season and in preparing for what's next?


