
With your continued prayers, my family and I will all get through this time together. We also pray for the church during these challenging times.


BASKET OF APPLES KIDS CRAFT

Painting with apples: Cut apples in half as show in picture number 1. Push a fork into the apple for a handle. Use 3 paper plates with tempera paint to stencil with the apples onto a piece of white construction paper. It is very pretty if you use green, yellow and red for 3 colors of apples or you can make them all one color. Set the apple into the paint as the picture number 1 shows and then place on paper and pull straight up when removing. Your paper will have the image of an apple. Make as many apples as you want on your paper. Once you have all the apples on your paper, put it up to dry.

Once dried, glue strips of brown construction across the apples as shown in picture number 2. This will make your apples look as if they are in a basket.

You should really enjoy making this basket of apples.


